PREFACE

REDD+ Drawing Competition: Our Forests, Green Planet

Forests are critically important for life on this planet – not just the lives of wild animals and plants, but also for human life. While the food we eat mostly comes from farms, in order to produce all that food, the farmers rely on a plentiful and regular supply of water. Where forests are abundant, this is normally not a problem, but when forests are lost, the supply of water is much less regular and predictable. So, as Cambodia loses its forests, the regular supply of food becomes less and less certain.

Forests also supply other benefits, not just for those living in and around forests, but for all of us. Valuable materials like bamboo and rattan come from forests, as do many medicines. Landscapes with forests are very attractive to tourists, and tourists require transportation, hotel rooms, and food, and buy souvenirs, thereby providing income for many Cambodians, including those who live far from the forests.

While standing forests provide many benefits, when forests are lost there is a high price to pay. Besides losing the regular supply of water to farms, when forests are lost, soil erosion accelerates dramatically and destroying forests contributes to the global problem of climate change.

Why then, if forests are so important, has Cambodia been losing forests so rapidly in the last few decades? Answers to that question are actually quite complex. The perceived financial benefits of using forest land for other purposes and a short-term view of many entrepreneurs are some of the reasons. But equally important is the fact that many in Cambodia do not fully understand the importance of forests.

In order to raise awareness among the general public of the importance of protecting forests, and of a new international mechanism called “REDD+”, which reduces the impact of global climate change by protecting forests, the REDD+ Taskforce Secretariat organized a drawing competition in November, 2013. The competition was open to Cambodian schoolchildren in two different categories: 7-11 years old, and 12-14 years old, and was co-sponsored by Smart, Cambodia’s leading mobile telephone company.

48 children from more than nine different schools participated in the competition. It proved to be an event that showcased the impressive talents of many schoolchildren, as the drawings were of a very high quality. This book reproduces all of the drawings. We hope that readers are equally impressed with the quality of the drawings and gain inspiration from the talents of the schoolchildren to contribute to the protection of Cambodia’s forests.

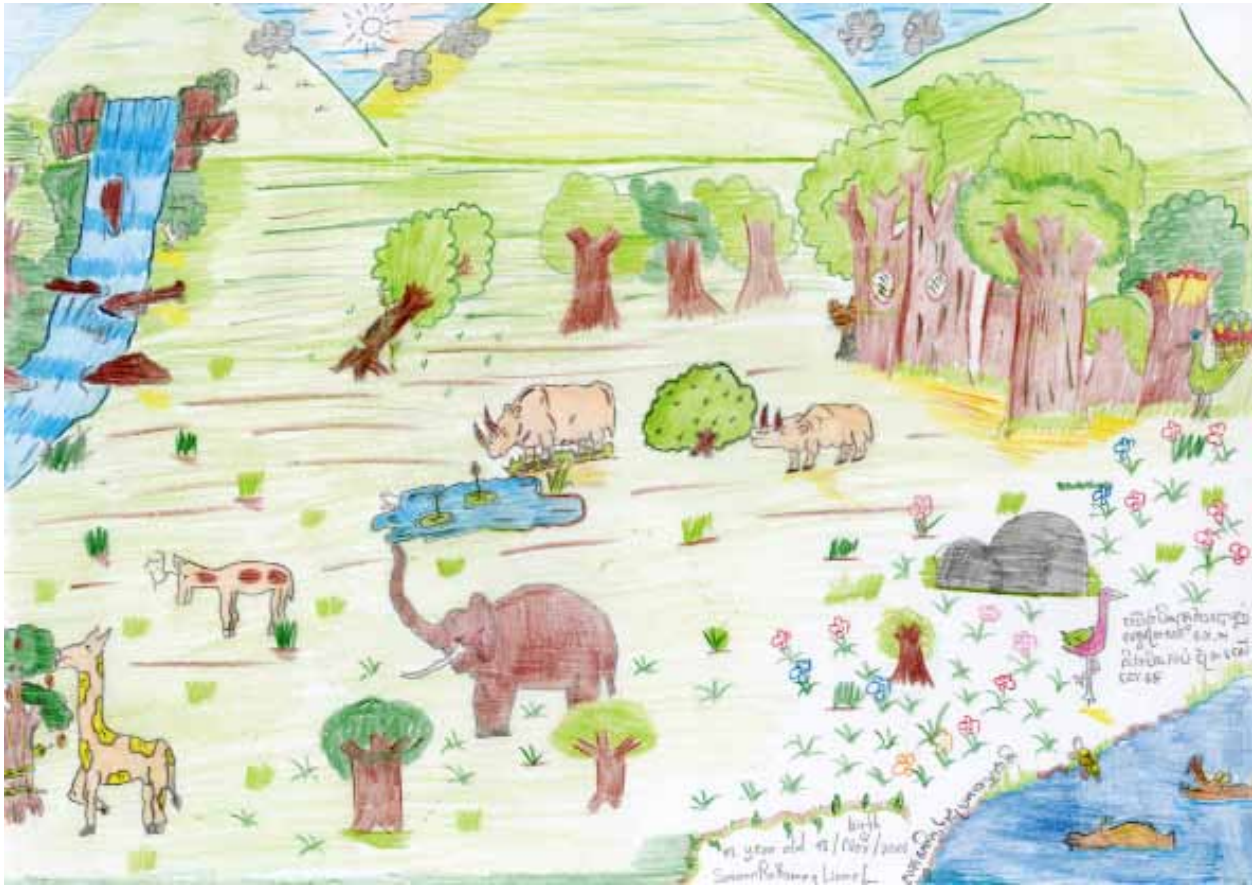

Khveurv Phyeurth's Understanding of REDD+

“Emissions from Industrialized countries can be absorbed by the forest in our country, Cambodia”, said Khveurv Phyeurth, a 45-year-old mother of four from Andoung Krroleng village, Mondulkiri province.

Mrs. Khveurv Phyeurth is one of the only four female committee members among the thirteen who are in charge of land titling for indigenous peoples of Andoung Krroleng village. She, along with others, has shown much interest in REDD+, participating in various seminars, workshops, lectures, and activities organized by organizations like the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS). WCS has been carrying out an awareness raising campaign in two pilot areas: Seima (Mondulki-ri) and Kulen Promtep (Preah Vihear), Cambodia.

Mrs. Khveurv Phyeurth plays a major role in disseminating information she has gained to her fellow people as well as returning feedback to the WCS programme.

She told the program how much she has noticed the changes in climate due to the loss of forest, and how it affects cultivation patterns, and has led to deteriorating yields for her people. The forest is no longer as beautiful; foraging is becoming harder, and so is her livelihood.

As put by Mrs. Khveurv Phyeurth, there is very little, if anything, that her people can do about the illegal logging when those behind it are high-ranking people. But against all odds, Mrs. Khveurv Phyeurth retains much hope in the programme.

She said, “...But I believe that implementation of REDD+ will surely help improve our forest, and along the way our livelihood. We are determined to participate, to protect the forest because we believe when there is forest; there are natural resources, wildlife, and so much more that we and our descendants can once again rely upon.”
